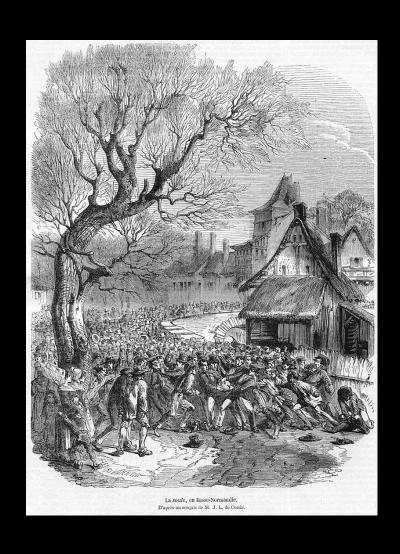

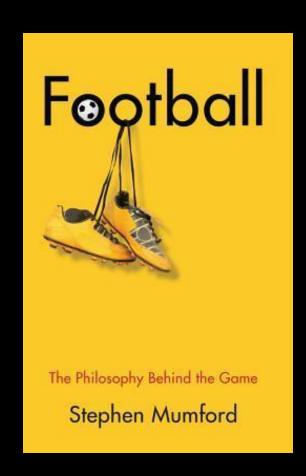

The concept of culture

(Elements of its analysis and critique)

- "Culture" retains from its etymology: the caring attitude that accompanies a natural development (the growth of a plant, childcare, funeral rites)
- Emerges as a concept at contact zones (result of migration, commerce, "exploration"): doing "it" differently. In history: whenever imperial expansion led to distinctions between "us" and "them". Most recently in the Early Modern Period ("discoveries") and its later theoretical outcomes (Enlightenment universalism, early anthropology)
- As a field of distinction and domination
- Culture as a factor of social and collective life which "forms" the individual throughout its cognitive development
- A crucial factor in social politics (regulation of how to "do things", and how to do them better)
